Late last term the new learning spaces for Year 9 and 10, as well as a senior study space, were officially handed over by our builders. It means that students from Years 7 -10 are engaged in a dynamic learning environment. The technology rich spaces, with agile furniture, accommodate the flexible learning approach we have adopted at Delany.

Teachers are able to plan for learning opportunities that replicate real world workplace experiences. For example, students are charged to work in teams to find solutions for problems and/or create products. The skills and aptitude required to work in teams are explicitly taught, as one would expect, to work cohesively and effectively. The concepts addressed are analysed using skills that include critical reflection and cognitive organisers.

Delany College is in a fortunate position as not only having acquired contemporary learning spaces but that we have developed the learning frameworks that support effective teaching and learning.

Stage Five students (Years 9 and 10) completed their move into their "new home" at Delany College this term. and are currently enjoying the space, the technology, and the expanded learning opportunities such amazing learning areas provide.

Late in Term 1, Years 9 and 10 attended tours of their new areas, and then were invited to name their new learning spaces.

Year 10 suggested that their space be called Kildare, named after the Irish county of which Daniel Delany, founder of the Patrician Brothers and namesake of our College, was Bishop.

Kildare is divided into a number of zones. The largest is Kildare Central, where students come to "Headquarters" our meeting place. Central is fitted mainly with wheeled desks and chairs, but also boasts three media-scape areas where students can airplay their group's ongoing work



onto monitors. Central also contains a Tutorial room and two "Genius Bars", also complete with monitors and airplay capability.

Adjoining Central are two large spaces. The Seminar Room is ringed with glass-boards for student use, and furnished with university-style seat-desks to enable quick reshaping of the area. The Learning Lab, which contains wheeled-desks that can be raised to accommodate students who are standing as they work, or lowered for when students prefer to work seated.

The jewel in the Kildare crown is the area students have named "Google", which is furnished with scattered side tables between multi-coloured lounges and ottomans.

In naming their space, Year 9 suggested Carlow, the Irish county which was home to the first school initiated by Bishop Daniel Delany.

Carlow is quite a different configuration from Kildare. It consists of one large open space containing multiple zones furnished with wheeled chairs and desks, "university-style" seats, and desks and chairs that can be raised and lowered. It also houses media-scapes and "Genius Bars".

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Delany College in the tradition and spirit of the Patrician Brothers "Pride, Persistence, Passion!"

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Nestled between Carlow and Kildare is the senior study area of Tullow, named for the town in Ireland where Daniel Delany was first stationed as a priest. As well as lounges, ottomans and tables in the central area, it has a tutorial room for small-group study, and a larger glass-enclosed study area which accommodates senior class groups.

The learning in each space is supported through multiple large, networked television monitors to which students can project their work, and multiple glass-boards for students to brainstorm and organise their thinking and learning. The senior study also has a bank of computers for senior student use.

The spaces were carefully designed to support students as they learn to communicate, collaborate, think critically and create - the capabilities which are not only important for them as learners today, but will be essential for them as they become the citizens and workers of tomorrow.

ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL


Speaking in public with an audience in front of you is one of those challenging situations - one that makes your heart pump and palms sweat.

The Mock Trial competition has been running for many years (even I participated when I was at school) and provides students a small window of insight to court formalities and proceedings.

Another event that was launched last week was the Delany College Monsignor McGovern Portrait Prize. This competition is open to all year 5 and 6 local Catholic primary school students. Last Friday Ms Broue and two year 10 students visited one of these schools to provide a workshop on portrait painting. The competition will culminate with an exhibition and prize awards evening on Tuesday 26 July at 5.30pm (next term). More information will be provided as the evening approaches.

YEAR 11 2017 SUBJECT SELECTION

From now until the end of this term Year 10 will work through a process to choose their subjects for Year 11 2017. All Year 11 students must select 12 units for the Preliminary course.

Students must consider if they wish to obtain an ATAR to enable them to go to University. This does impact on the courses they can select.

The course is an opportunity for students doing their HSC to learn about the care of children in an Early Childhood facility (eg. Childcare) as a part of their HSC. BUILDING CHILD SAFE COMMUNITIES – NEW FORMS FOR ALL VOLUNTEERS AND CONTRACTORS

'Building Child Safe Communities' is a new initiative developed by Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta that enhances our commitment to ensuring the safety and wellbeing of all students in our care. It is now a requirement that all volunteers and contractors complete an online undertaking form that confirms expectations in relation to behaviour whilst volunteering or contracting at schools, Catholic Out of Schools Hours Care and Catholic Early Learning Centres. This undertaking form also seeks to determine the suitability of volunteers and contractors by requiring them to declare that they do not have a criminal history involving children.

Volunteers – please click on 'Building Child Safe Communities – Undertaking for Volunteers' or access the form via the Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta public webpage http://www.parra.catholic.edu.au, then click on 'Child Protection Training Forms' (halfway down page on the right hand side).



Then click on 'Volunteer Form' (halfway down page).

You will receive a confirmation email once the form has been submitted. Your details are maintained confidentially in a central database and a copy of your confirmation is emailed to the location where you are volunteering.

Contractors – please click on 'Building Child Safe Communities – Undertaking for Contractors or access the form via the Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta public webpage http://www.parra.catholic.edu.au, then click on 'Child Protection Training Forms' (halfway down page on the right hand side).



Then click on 'Contractor Form' (bottom of page).

You will receive a confirmation email once the form has been submitted. Your details are maintained confidentially in a central database and a copy of your confirmation is emailed to the location where you are contracting.

A new form is required:

- For each location that you are a volunteer or contractor
- If any of the details you have provided on the form change
