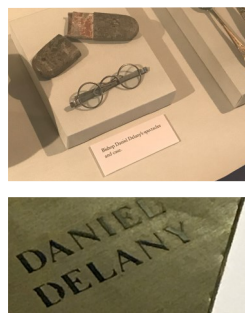
As a way of connecting with our Patrician roots we visited the Church of the Holy Rosary, Tullow where the body of Bishop Daniel Delany is interned. It was a special occasion as we had Mass and prayers over his crypt surrounded by stained glass windows depicting his mission in Ireland. We also had time to visit the Delany museum attached to the church that housed different exhibitions displaying personal artefacts of Delany and illustrating the history of the Patrician story.

We all took great pleasure in meeting many Brothers actively working across Ireland and celebrating their achievements in education or social work. We also heard stories of legends like Br Paul O'Connor who, in the mid-nineteenth century, walked for four days from Tullow to Galway to establish a school for boys. This school is still there today!!

We are forever indebted to the commitment and energy of the Brothers in establishing schools in Ireland and to men like Br Aengus who, in leaving their families behind to answer God's call, travelled to Australia with the view of providing a Catholic education for all.

I take this opportunity to thank staff, student and parents for their generosity in collecting \$6000.00 for the Delany Foundation. This money will be spent in supporting the building of a Patrician school in Ghana and developing learning resources for the children in that school.

ATTENDANCE AT SCHOOL

The image below is a snapshot of Delany's student attendance as at Monday 16 October 2017.

We can see that the attendance level for all year groups is below where it really needs to be. To put it in a practical perspective consider a student who has an attendance level of 80%. This means that the student would be missing (on average) **one day every week of the year**. We know that successful students are those who attend classes on a regular basis and minimise days lost from school.

Everything we do at Delany College is important: classes, excursions, exams, sports carnivals and activities. Each one of these is a building block for a successful and engaged student which is underpinned by students' attendance at school.

Target: so close to 90%

Looking inside our school data it can be seen that there are many students who are just below our 90% target. At this level it is just a day or two of accumulated absences that make the difference.

- 17 students are at 89% attendance
- 12 students are at 88% attendance
- 12 students are at 87% attendance

I challenge all students to attend every possible day of learning during term 4.

In particular, attendance is required by all students up to and including the last day of term 4 - Friday 15 December.

CURRICULUM

LEARNING TO LEARN

Developing critical thinking skills is emerging from the educational literature as a skill that students need to learn for the twenty first century. No longer are students called upon just to remember facts but they are required to synthesise their knowledge and apply it to many different and changing real life situations like you and I have to do in our jobs every day.

Until a few years ago, most teachers thought that teaching simply involved filling a student's head with information. Knowledge was 'transmitted' from the teacher to the student, generally by lecture. This thinking and practice are firmly entrenched in most classrooms despite the fact that the ineffectiveness of lecture-based teaching had been known for quite some time.

Modern cognitive psychology tells us that learning is a constructive, not receptive, process. This theory states that understanding comes through experiences and interaction with the environment, and that the learner uses a foundation of previous knowledge to construct new understanding.

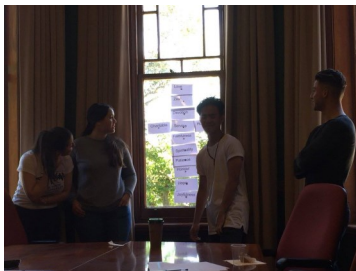
Consequently, the learner has primary responsibility for constructing knowledge and understanding, not the teacher. In a constructivist classroom, the teacher is no longer the "authority" but instead is a guide or facilitator who assists students in learning.

It is our commitment at Delany College to provide your children with the best education that we can provide to set them up for great success at University, TAFE or work. Switching to a more constructive approach and using technology in learning is the way, we believe, will allow your children, our students, to develop the skills that they will need to thrive outside school.

Already this term, we have had twenty students involved in a Coding Workshop using Unity software to design and develop a game platform. Students were able to utilise their critical and creative skills to work with experts in game coding.



Delany was also host to a teacher workshop on Cuberider. The Cuberider Space Program transforms an everyday science class into mission control whilst teaching students core science and mathematics, as well as workforce-critical problem solving skills. This exciting and innovative program is project based learning with real world outcomes with schools sending experiments to the International Space Station to be tested, data recorded, and results analysed in the classroom.

Delany teachers are always looking for new and effective ways to challenge and engage students and to make learning relevant and meaningful.

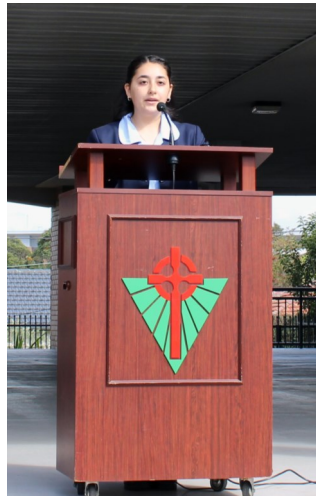
THE ANZAC SPIRIT

Mary travelled to Anzac sites as a representative of the NSW Government. She travelled to significant Australian battlefields in Belgium and France on a 12 day tour of the Western Front, along with students from other schools.

This is Mary's story.

"Nearly 4 weeks ago I was fortunate enough to embark on my journey to find the true meaning of what the ANZAC spirit is about. My experience was to gain a glimpse of what war was like, and although I had a glimpse of what it would have been like that glimpse was so much more than I could've ever achieved or appreciated from the internet, textbook or an image.

The first stop in the commemoration of the soldiers was London, England or as I like to call it Shakespeare land. One of my favorite memories was having the ability to be embraced in the rich cultural history, standing in front of the remake of Shakespeare's Globe Theatre, being so close I could touch it. Likewise on the same level, I enjoyed examining the Australian war memorial in London, where 102,000 killed Australian heroes of the First and Second World Wars were commemorated.

of proteins and vegetables combined and mashed up into one plate. It was close to abysmal, the experience led me to further appreciate the sacrifice of all the servicemen and women. That day in Belgium also consisted of wearing the Australian WW1 uniform and carrying only half the weight they would have carried whilst travelling on the road to Passchendaele for kilometers upon kilometers. From marching, doing drills grenade throwing and aiming rifles this was one of the experiences that gave me a glimpse of the struggles endured by soldiers.

The final destination was Paris, France my most memorable experience was seeing the Eiffel Tower in person, which was overwhelming, seeing the Eiffel Tower on a 13 inch screen is one thing but seeing meters upon meters in another, having the experience to cruise around and be embraced in such detailed architecture and history was remarkable.

From all the spectacular experiences, one experience that was so overpowering for me was visiting over 10 cemeteries each containing more than 100 bodies and or names of soldiers. What made it difficult for me was putting a name to a number, so often we hear that 5, 200 men died in this battle, and another 10,000 in this battle, but so little do we ever hear the names of these warriors, the life of these heroes and the experiences of these Australian patriots, being a part of this journey allowed me to reflect on each name that I walked past, and further understand their life not only on the battlefields but also in Australia.

Another aspect that I gained was the development of spirit, friendship and a sense of community in a group, much like the comradery of soldiers at war who kept each other upbeat despite the difficulty of their circumstances. These are now new bonds that I will never forget.



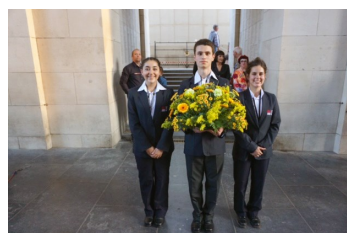
After being a part of the Premiers ANZAC Scholarship 2017, I now have a greater sense of appreciation of what our soldiers did for us. It really opened my eyes to see and further acknowledge the sacrifice they made. I am so fortunate and thankful that Delany College had the faith in me to make my journey and discover the true meaning of the ANZAC spirit and I am honored and privileged to have been selected as a scholar and a part of the 2017 Premier's ANZAC Scholarship representing Delany College.

The final message that I'd like to leave with is that this is now not only my legacy to remember but ours, Delany College, to make sure that our generation remember. "In the face of unimaginable sadness, it's easy to look away. But the only thing we can do to honour those who were left behind is to remember them."
